"WHO IS MORE PUNK: Sex Pistols or Chumbawamba?"

00:00	<u>Introduction</u>
00:04	Fuck you,
00:05	and welcome to Punk Battles: The only
00:07	show where I decide who is more Punk,
00:10	and I would know. I'm a pretty "punk" guy.
00:14	Now first up today, we've got the Sex Pistols.
00:16	Legendary punk band and the reason I
00:18	learned how to do this face.
00:20	They were together for two and a half
00:21	Years, and in that time put out only one
00:23	album,
00:24	"Never mind the Bollocks." They're facing
00:25	off against Chumbawamba,
00:27	who had hit songs like 'that one your mom
00:29	listens to when she's having a bad day,'
00:31	and nothing else, really. They were
00:33	featured on albums such as
00:34	'90s mix,' '90s sports anthems,' '80s and 90s
00:38	Hits,'

00:39	'90s birthday party,' and '90s nostalgia.'
00:42	So, let's find out who was more punk: the Sex
00:45	Pistols
00:45	or Chumbawamba?
00:47	Round 1: Origin story
00:48	The Sex Pistols were a band
00:49	formed by its manager, Malcolm McLaren,
00:52	who had seen how big punk was about to
00:53	be
00:54	and he wanted in. McLaren owned an
00:56	expensive alternative
00:58	clothing store, called "Sex," so he called
01:00	the band
01:01	"The Sex Pistols," mostly to advertise for his
01:04	store,
01:05	which is kind of like a punk band being
01:06	called the "Calvin Klein Billy Clubs."
01:09	Malcolm McLaren meticulously crafted the
01:11	group's image, he
01:12	gave them clothes to wear and he wanted
01:14	them to be as controversial as possible,
01:16	to generate free publicity.
01:19	Probably the most musically talented
01:21	member of the band, Glen Matlock,

01:23	left after repeated clashes with McLaren.
01:25	Later saying
01:26	"it was just like being in the Monkees."
01:29	Glen was replaced by a friend of singer,
01:31	Johnny Rotten,
01:32	named Sid Vicious. Sid was a heroin
01:35	addicted twink
01:36	who was chosen, by Malcolm, completely for
01:40	his look.
01:41	He could not play bass at all, and
01:43	refused to learn.
01:44	So, when did they sell out? Well, I think
01:46	it's fair to say that the Sex Pistols,
01:48	Somehow,
01:49	sold out before existing. You know, it's
01:51	kind of hard to come at them like
01:52	"What happened to you, Sex Pistols? It used
01:55	to be about selling expensive clothes,"
01:57	you know? But, yeah, at the end of the day
02:00	there are Boy Bands. And I know
02:02	it makes people upset when you call the Sex
02:03	Pistols a 'Boy Band,' but
02:05	first of all: being in a Boy Band doesn't
02:07	mean their music is bad. Who doesn't love

02:09	the bass line to "Backstreet's Back"? Okay
02:12	And, also,
02:13	they were formed as a product of market
02:14	research.
02:15	Named, given clothing to wear, chosen
02:18	more for their looks than their musical
02:20	Ability, by one
02:22	guy, Malcolm McLaren, who had complete
02:25	control over them.
02:26	Even their guitarist, Steve Jones, once
02:28	said "He used to really get the hump,
02:31	McLaren, when we started asking for money,
02:34	so I stopped asking for it. We never had
02:37	our own lawyer, which is insanity.
02:39	That's the closest thing to being in one
02:41	of these boy bands
02:43	is that they all get reamed, and we were
02:45	getting reamed in that department."
02:47	All right, Chumbawamba time. So, before
02:49	Chumbawamba was a band, there were a
02:51	bunch of anarchists.
02:52	Illegally squatting in a house together,
02:54	spending their days liberating animals
02:56	and organizing community services. One

02:59	day, they happened to be at a musician's
03:01	collective hanging out, when
03:02	someone asked how many people there were
03:04	in bands.
03:06	"For a laugh we sort of went 'Oh we're a
03:08	Band,' which
03:09	we weren't, we were just a bunch of punks
03:12	he passed this paper around so we wrote
03:14	'Chimp Eats Banana' and we put our names
03:16	down.
03:17	About a week later, he rang us up, said
03:19	'I've got a gig for you man, it's in two
03:21	weeks.'
03:22	And obviously none of us, we couldn't
03:24	play any instruments.
03:26	So we thought 'Right you be the singer,
03:28	I'll play the drums, you play [the] guitar.'
03:31	we borrowed some stuff, and that's how it
03:33	Started."
03:34	Chimp Eats Banana became Chumbawamba. They
03:36	were together for about 30 years,
03:38	and in all that time they put out a ton
03:40	of albums
03:41	many of which never ended up on Spotify.

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03:43	And while their musical style evolved,
03:46	from Anarcho-Punk
03:47	to Techno Dance Folk and Pop Music,
03:51	they never really lost sight of their
03:52	anarchist roots, putting radical messages
03:55	on
03:55	all of their many albums. So when did
03:57	Chumbawamba sell out? Well, they had
03:59	already been
04:00	a band for about 20 years when they
04:02	signed with EMI.
04:03	After years of criticizing the label, uh,
04:06	being on a
04:07	compilation album called Fuck EMI, and,
04:10	one time,
04:11	smearing an EMI office with blood,
04:14	a lot of people criticize them for being
04:16	anti-capitalists signing with a
04:17	capitalist
04:18	record label. And their response to that
04:20	was essentially that
04:21	all of the indie labels they'd been on
04:23	before were just as capitalist,
04:26	only they weren't as good at it. So, if

04:29	they really wanted a shot at spreading
04:31	their anarchist message as far as
04:32	possible,
04:33	they needed to sign with a major label.
04:35	To be fair to them this choice
04:37	fairly quickly paid off with the release
04:39	of "Tubthumping,"
04:41	the one song of theirs you've probably
04:43	Heard that one about getting knocked
04:44	down
04:45	and getting back up again. I dare you:
04:47	just
04:48	try and listen to that song all the way
04:50	through
04:51	without being converted into a full-on
04:53	anarcho-communist.
04:55	It can't be done.

05:00	Round 2: The big red "A"
05:01	Punk is associated with left-wing
05:02	politics, particularly
05:05	anarchy. (Or actually this, this "A" stands
05:07	for "Ashlee Simpson" but)

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05:08	let's see how these two bands stack up:
05:10	Now, you've probably heard the song
05:12	"Anarchy in the UK" before, if you've ever
05:14	been to karaoke night with me.
05:16	It's a great song. Very catchy and it has
05:19	the word 'anarchy' in the title,
05:21	but is it really an anarchist song?
05:24	Johnny Rotten has said, at various times,
05:26	"I've always been an
05:27	Anarchist," "I am a natural-born anarchist,"
05:30	"I have never been an anarchist, what gave
05:33	you that idea?"
05:34	Seems the only reason this song is about
05:36	anarchy at all is because Johnny
05:38	Rotten was looking for a word that
05:39	rhymed with "antichrist,"
05:41	and in the end he never did find that
05:43	Word, But he decided to shoehorn
05:45	"anarchist" into the line instead. At the
05:47	Time, he did know at least
05:49	one real life anarchist. The artist Jamie
05:52	Reed, who created the band's
05:54	iconic ransom notes aesthetic you find
05:57	on their posters and their album cover.

05:59	And apparently Johnny Rotten had Jamie
06:01	Reed in mind as he wrote this song.
06:03	Anarchy is a widely misunderstood
06:05	political philosophy,
06:06	to the point where in the last U.S.
06:08	election, both candidates for president
06:10	denounced anarchists for their
06:12	supposedly violent world view.
06:14	But, in reality, the dream of an anarchist
06:16	world shouldn't be that scary:
06:18	Think of it, not as a violent chaotic
06:20	society,
06:21	but as an egalitarian one without rulers
06:24	or unjustified hierarchies.
06:26	Anarcho-communism [An-Com] essentially just
06:28	means
06:29	'caring and sharing.' An-Coms are basically
06:32	Care Bears. And sure,
06:34	some Care Bears may advocate violence as
06:37	a method of
06:38	getting us all to the magical land of
06:39	Care-A-Lot, but
06:41	it's less about 'violence' and 'fires' than
06:43	it is about

'community gardens,' 'collective housing' and
'excruciatingly long voting sessions'.
The thing is, "Anarchy in the UK" is not
about
real anarchy. It's about fake anarchy,
the kind everyone's afraid of. Its goal
as a song
is probably just to frighten the parents
of Sex Pistols' fans.
Let's have a look at some of the lyrics
that aren't just Johnny Rotten
repeatedly saying
"I want to be anarchy," which is not
something you can be.
It is a political philosophy, not a
job. "I am an anti-christ /
I am an anarchist / don't know what I
Want / but I know how to get it /
I want to destroy the passerby." Hmm,
'mutual aid,' 'expropriation,'
something about 'vouchers' I don't see
anything in here about
'wanting to destroy passers-by.'
Huh. Well, that can't be right. If anything,

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looks like they want to <i>help</i> passers-by.
Huh.
"Anarchy in the UK" lists off a few scary
Acronyms:
they are the MPLA, the UDA, and the IRA.
These are, respectively, a
Marxist-Leninist group in
Angola, a loyalist group in Northern
Ireland,
and a group that fought to bring about a
Republic for
all of Ireland. You'll notice, none of
these groups are, in any way, anarchist.
But, they are all violent groups that
killed a lot of people, [which] would have
presumably been
pretty alarming to hear on a song, that
your British child
was listening to, in 1976. So again,
it's more about violence than it is
about actual anarchy.
I still like the song, but I can't help
but wonder
what would it sound like if it were

08:38	Probably, a little something,
08:41	like this "Anarkay en va you-kaia / [Anarchy in the UK/]]
08:44	R'buildin' so'city wiv mushal ayed / [Rebuliding society with mutual aid /]
08:47	Eye-ar-keys must meet the b'rrrden of a [Hierarchies must meet the burden of]
08:49	proov for 'eir existence / n if vey [proof for their existence / and if they]
08:51	Canny, vey weo be disman'eled!" [cannot, they will be dismantled!"]
08:54	Yeah, no, it just doesn't have the same, uh,
08:58	energy to it just doesn't have the same
08:59	energy to it, that's the problem.
09:01	As already mentioned, Chumbawamba has
09:03	been an explicitly anarchist collective,
09:06	since the days they were all squatting
09:08	In a house together. They have albums and
09:10	songs about anarchy.
09:11	And their early albums, on Agitprop!
09:13	Records, contained liner notes educating
09:16	their fans about its principles.
09:17	Anarcho-syndicalism is a branch of
09:19	anarchy that advocates workers' rights
09:21	and unions

09:22	as a path towards an anarchist society.
09:25	Chumbawumba certainly seems to think
09:26	along those lines. They formed a
09:27	partnership with the Socialist Workers'
09:29	Union,
09:30	they would hang out in working men's
09:32	clubs, they would participate in strikes
09:34	and picket lines,
09:35	either by just joining the protesters or
09:37	performing for them.
09:39	During the UK Miner Strike they handed
09:42	out pamphlets,
09:43	donated food to miners' families, they
09:46	released a miner's benefit album,
09:48	and they even formed a theater troupe to
09:50	entertain the miners' children.
09:52	Unlike the Sex Pistols, Chumbawamba sometimes
09:54	could actually make people less afraid
09:56	of anarchy.
09:57	When they performed at the Rosie
09:59	O'Donnell show she introduced them as
10:01	"The nicest bunch of anarchists I've ever
10:04	met!"
10:05	When their song "Tubthumping" blew up,

10:06	Chumbawamba performed it at the BRIT
10:08	Awards,
10:09	surrounded by anarchist flags and
10:11	dressed in the anarcho-communist colors:
10:13	red and black. They were angry at the
10:15	center-left political party, Labor, at the
10:17	time,
10:18	for not supporting the UK Docker's strike,
10:21	so they changed some of the lyrics of
10:22	"Tubthumping" to "he drinks a whiskey
10:25	Drink/
10:26	he drinks a vodka drink / he drinks a
10:29	lager drink /
10:30	he drinks a cider drink. / New Labor
10:34	sold out the dockers, just like they'll
10:37	sell out the rest of us."
10:39	[Music;

10:41	Round 3: Opinions about Nazis and fascist iconography
10:42	Watching old Sex Pistols footage, you
10:43	might notice there's an odd amount of
10:45	swastikas in the crowd
10:46	and on stage. Sid Vicious loved his nazi
10:49	t-shirt. Johnny Rotten wore

10:51	*this* stupid shirt many times on stage.
10:54	Malcolm McLaren, who was at least part
10:56	ethnically Jewish,
10:58	would hand-out nazi armbands to the Sex
11:00	Pistols, and their associated acts,
11:02	before shows, which led to an incident
11:04	where the band The Clash
11:06	told the Sex Pistols that they couldn't
11:08	perform with them unless they all took
11:09	off their nazi armbands. So,
11:11	they're not in this contest, but I'm
11:13	giving The Clash a point for that.
11:15	So far they're beating the Sex Pistols.
11:16	Now personally, I don't
11:18	think they were nazis; I think they were
11:20	just trying to upset people,
11:22	exactly like when they talked about
11:24	"anarchy." You know, I think the fact that
11:26	Johnny Rotten ever wore this stupid
11:29	fucking shirt,
11:30	that was from Malcolm McLaren's Sex store,
11:33	which has both a swastika and the words
11:36	"I am an anarchist" on it, should kind of
11:39	give away the game that they were just

11:40	being
11:41	edgy boys. Funny thing is, though,
11:44	that just because they weren't nazis,
11:47	making a bunch of edgy references to
11:49	nazis
11:50	actually made real nazis feel welcome in
11:53	the punk scene.
11:54	Who would have guessed. Around this time
11:56	is when the Oi!
11:57	punk genre started, which contained many
12:00	bands who were
12:02	literal nazis and some who
12:05	weren't nazis but just refused to
12:07	condemn nazis, for some reason. (Great!)
12:12	Chumbawumba had a pretty clear stance on
12:14	Nazis, which was that they are bad; which
12:16	I would say is the correct stance. In
12:18	their song "The Day the Nazi Died,"
12:20	Chumbawamba critiques historians who act
12:23	like
12:23	nazis disappeared off the face of the
12:25	Earth the second World War II ended.
12:28	"So, if you meet with these historians
12:30	I'll tell you what to say /

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12:33	Tell them that the Nazis / never really
12:35	went away /
12:37	They're out there burning houses down /
12:39	and peddling racist
12:40	lies / and we'll never rest again / until
12:43	every Nazi dies."
12:45	They also really hated those fascist Oi!
12:47	bands.
12:48	And early in their career, they pranked a
12:50	bunch of them by recording an Oi! style
12:52	song,
12:52	under the fake name 'Skin Disease,' which
12:55	was actually included on an
12:57	Oi! compilation album. The lyrics of the
13:00	song are just the words
13:02	"I'm thick" repeated 64 times.
13:05	Which, I guess, is technically a prank.
13:08	I'm not sure if I get it, to be honest.
13:10	But I like the energy.
13:12	Joke's on you, racists, jamming out to a
13:14	song written by
13:15	people who don't respect you. Got 'em.
13:19	'Nazis owned.' "I'm thick."
13:20	Sure.

13:23 **Round 4: Punk Antics** 13:24 All right. Let's get into the fun 13:27 stuff: the punk antics. What were the Sex Pistols punk antics? 13:28 13:29 Well let me tell you, they were very 13:31 rude to interviewers. Very rude. Honestly, 13:35 it's great watch. 13:36 Watch a compilation of Johnny Rotten 13:37 just being a dick 13:39 to interviewers, for no reason. It's fun! 13:42 The band's first time being interviewed 13:43 on live tv, 13:44 Johnny Rotten said the word "shit," and 13:46 Steve Jones called the host a "dirty 13:48 fucker" and a "fucking rodder." 13:50 This incident led to them being dropped 13:52 by their label, EMI. 13:54 And according to legend, Malcolm McLaren 13:56 was very angry about this, 13:58 until the band experienced a surge in 13:59 Popularity, when he started to claim 14:02 that it was-- their profanity was all his

14:03	idea. I just love
14:05	the fact that McLaren, probably supplied
14:09	this dude in the background with his
14:10	nazi armband,
14:12	but thought that, say, calling the host a
14:14	"dirty fucker" was
14:16	a little bit past the line of decorum
14:18	even for punks.
14:20	Okay. Chumbawamba has had a lot of great
14:23	punk antics, so let's just let's just go
14:25	through them real quick.
14:26	Vocalist, Alice Netter, was dragged in the
14:28	British tabloid press, for saying in an
14:30	interview
14:31	"We like it when cops get killed. Nothing
14:33	can change the fact that we like it when
14:35	cops get killed. We mean that.
14:37	You choose sides, don't you?" On Bill
14:39	Maher's show, she also encouraged their
14:41	broke fans, who couldn't afford it,
14:43	to just steal their album from a large
14:45	chain store like HMV
14:47	or Virgin. Chumbawumba was offered one-
14:49	and-a-half-million dollars by Nike to

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14:51	use "Tubthumping"
14:52	in a World Cup commercial, which they
14:55	turned down
14:55	in a decision that apparently took them
14:57	about 30 seconds to make.
14:59	They did sell music rights to General
15:02	Motors
15:02	for a commercial, but they donated the
15:05	entire \$100,000.00 dollars
15:08	to activist groups who used it to start
15:10	an information and environmental
15:11	campaign
15 : 12	against General Motors. They recorded an
15:16	album, called <i>In Memoriam Margaret</i>
15:18	Thatcher
15:19	in 2005, which they didn't release until
15:22	2013,
15:23	after they had already split up as a
15:25	band, just to coincide with the death of
15:28	the famously anti-union
15:30	Margaret Thatcher. And finally, my
15:32	Favorite, at those same BRIT Awards where
15:34	they had the anarchist flags,
15:36	vocalist Danburt Nobacon went up to

15:39	UK Deputy Prime Minister John Prescott
15:42	and poured an entire bucket of ice water
15:45	on his head.
15:47	Amazing. Sex Pistols would never.
15:52	[Music;

15:53	Round 5: Ultimate Cred Challenge
15:55	Now, another way to judge punk bands is
15:56	by seeing how influenced they were by
15:59	the most punk band of all time: the Sex
16:00	Pistols.
16:01	Now, well, the Sex Pistols have never
16:03	once claimed to have
16:04	been influenced by the Sex Pistols: zero
16:07	points.
16:08	Chumbawamba, on the other hand, has
16:10	repeatedly and clearly claimed Sex
16:12	Pistols as an influence,
16:13	and they even put out an album about not
16:15	Voting, called Never Mind the Ballots.
16:17	So yeah, they're getting the point for
16:19	that one, too.
16:20	[Music;
	Punk Battles Score: Sex Pistols (0), [The Clash (1),] Chumbawumba (5)]

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16:22	Who Wins?
16:23	So who's more punk? Well, I tallied up the
16:24	score, and it turns out
16:25	it doesn't matter. It's really not punk
16:28	to argue about
16:29	"who is more punk?" When the Sex Pistols
16:31	Started, they didn't even know about the
16:33	word punk, so there were no punk rules to
16:35	follow.
16:36	But, at the same time, I mean, obviously
16:40	Chumbawumba is objectively more punk
16:42	than Sex Pistols. I mean, who could even
16:43	argue otherwise? I, like Johnny Rotten
16:47	voted for Trump twice, supported Brexit
16:50	and
16:51	said 'All Lives Matter' as recently as
16:53	2020, so
16:55	fuck that guy, to be honest. Hey,
16:58	maybe your definition of punk is
16:59	different than mine. Maybe you think
17:01	punk is just about making people upset.
17:05	And by that criteria, I guess Sex Pistols
17:07	probably
17:08	are more punk than Chumbawamba. Their

17:10	music and
17:11	their behavior was specifically designed
17:15	to upset the parents of the kids
17:17	listening to it, and by that metric,
17:19	Lil Pump is also extremely punk
17:22	("Lil Punk," more like). Making this video,
17:25	I've listened to
17:26	a ton of Chumbawamba, and I gotta say, I
17:29	kind of love it. Especially their early
17:31	albums that are more punk.
17:33	I'll link a few in the description, if
17:34	you're curious. And also,
17:36	I still listen to the one album the Sex
17:39	Pistols made, sometimes,
17:40	because I like it. I've decided that, for
17:42	me personally, art
17:43	doesn't always need to be justified by
17:45	its politics. Art can exist
17:47	for its own sake. And yes, good politics
17:50	make art
17:51	better, but it can still be good without
17:54	it,
17:54	so I'm not going to shame you if you
17:56	still listen to Sex Pistols. That would

17:58	make me a huge hypocrite.
17:59	I'm only going to shame you if you still
18:01	think they're the most punk band of all
18:02	time.
18:04	They're not. This has been Punk Battles
18:06	with Chill Goblin.
18:08	Fuck you and good night.
